○ Characteristics and history

The Faculty of Education, the sole faculty at the Hokkaido University of Education, has five campuses (Sapporo, Hakodate, Asahikawa, Kushiro and Iwamizawa) and covers all areas of education.

- Teacher Training Course (Sapporo, Asahikawa, Kushiro)
- Each Campus offers a unique program to afford students opportunities to learn practical teaching skills they will need in their teaching fields.

- The Department of International and Regional Studies (Hakodate) – The goal of the Department of International and Regional Studies at Hakodate Campus is to develop human resources that could revitalize regions with an international point of view, a spirit of education, and excellent communication skills.

- The Department of Arts, Sports, and Cultural Studies (Iwamizawa) – The goal of the Department of Arts, Sports, and Cultural Studies at Iwamizawa Campus is to develop human resources that could apply the cultural values of arts and sports to solving various issues in regions and center the regional revitalization with ideas of how to link those cultural values with new cultural businesses.

○ Outline of the course (study period from one year to one and half year)

• Specialized training

【one year course】: Students who have completed the 6 month Japanese language education course approved by the Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology may start their research at Hokkaido University of Education as described in “a) Course” below.

【one and half year course】: Students may start their research in October 2023 as described in “a) Course” below.

a) Course: The student's program will be arranged according to his or her research interests. An instructor from the appropriate field will direct this research. International students can elect to take classes offered to regular students and study alongside their Japanese classes.

b) Classes in English: None. Instruction is exclusively in Japanese.
c) Supplementary courses: Once they enter the program, if necessary, students may take Japanese courses offered by the Hokkaido University of Education.

• Other

The program at Sapporo, Hakodate, Asahikawa and Kushiro campus includes visits to primary and secondary schools attached to the university for observation and training.

◇ Follow-up for graduates

After completion of the program, students may continue to use the HUE email provided.

◇ Accommodations

We will help each trainee teacher to find a place in an off-campus apartment, if the student is assigned to Sapporo Campus). If space permits, students may be assigned a room in the dormitory for both Japanese and International students.

○ Characteristics of the program

Foreign students will be assisted in their studies by advisors from a broad range of fields: the humanities, social sciences, natural sciences applied science, arts and crafts, physical education, pedagogy, and education for the handicapped.

○ Number of students to be accepted: 3 students

○ Outline of the course

• Japanese language education

Students would take Japanese classes for 6 months offered by Hirosaki University Department of International Education and Collaboration (called International Exchange Courses). Depending on the students' Japanese abilities and taking their special subjects into consideration, make-up classes are also offered 8 hours per week. They can attend Japanese language classes throughout the Program.

• Specialized training

Students take specialized training, which is mainly research project with their advisor, after Japanese language education for a year. Lectures in faculty department are available for trainees.

• Practical training, participatory subjects such as field trips and regional exchanges

Based on the interests of students, they go on a field trip of classes and international exchange activities at schools (kindergartens, primary schools, junior high schools, and special needs schools) attached to Hirosaki University, and institutions and facilities related to school and social education. Students can take classes for Japanese cultures including hands-on learning offered by International Exchange Courses.

• Others

Japanese conversation study by Japanese tutors is available.

Consultations for graduates about their career development.

◇ Accommodations

There are no specific accommodations for national scholarship students. The Department of International and Collaboration will help the students find apartments, it takes approximately ¥30,000 to ¥40,000 per month.

Features of the Program: (1) Japanese language study and courses offered by the Faculty of Education on the same campus!
(2) The opportunity to participate in the Japanese school internship program.

University overview

Characteristics and history

Iwate University is 2.5 hours from Tokyo by bullet train and is **located in the city of Morioka**, which has a population of 300,000 and is surrounded by pristine nature. The university consists of 4 faculties and 5 graduate degree programs. There are about 4,600 undergraduate students and 800 graduate students, supported by 720 members of faculty and staff. The student to teacher ratio in the Faculty of Education is **10:1**, ensuring students and faculty have close contact. It offers programs for all subjects taught in secondary education, and has four affiliated schools: a kindergarten, an elementary school, a junior high school, and a special-needs school. This environment enables the teacher-trainee to study education theoretically and practically.

Outline of the course for Teacher-Training students

○ Participants can learn both basic Japanese and take specialty courses in education. They can also experience Japanese education through participating in the school internship program (SIP). Additionally, the International Center offers courses on Japanese culture and organizes various events for international students, including a ski trip. At the end of this program, students receive certificates of completion for the program and SIP. The two types of courses are 18 months long.

Number of students to be accepted: 3

[1.5 year course in specialty] Student focuses on courses or research in specialty only and does not take Japanese language courses.

[1 year course in specialty] Student begins courses or research in specialty after 6 months of Japanese language training.

Japanese language education / International Education Center :
Teacher-training students spend 15 to 17 periods a week for a span of 14 weeks in an intensive Japanese program at the Iwate University International Center.

Specialized training / Faculty of Education :
Teacher-training students take lectures and seminars, write research papers and receive guidance from their academic advisors.

Practical training, Participatory subjects such as field trips and regional exchanges :

Students also experience Japanese education through participating in the school internship program (SIP). They can take lectures at both the undergraduate and graduate level.

Additional Information

After the intensive Japanese study has finished, students are still eligible to take Japanese classes.

A Japanese graduate student serves as a tutor.

Follow-up for graduates

After students leave, they can receive continued contact and personalized support. For example, an advisor can give a recommendation letter for students who want to continue their education.

Accommodations

International students can live in a dormitory called International House located on campus. It has a share house type room (a unit to share with 4 roommates) and a single room. Family rooms and couple rooms are not available. *Residence fees are to be paid monthly, and no need to pay full amount in advance.

It is known that the elementary and junior high school students in Akita have top-level academic ability in annual nationwide academic achievement tests carried out by Japanese Government. The Teacher Training Students can visit and inspect schools offering excellent education in Akita Prefecture, including affiliated schools of Akita University. Students may also participate in local field surveys and join regional activities. The course aims to deepen students' understanding of specialized subjects while taking advantage of Akita's educational and local resources.

○ Outline of the course

The period of the course, including Japanese language classes, is for one year and a half in principle. It is also possible not to take Japanese classes if your Japanese language abilities are sufficient for this program.

• Japanese language education

You can take Japanese language and culture classes according to your Japanese language level.

1. Lectures, seminars, trainings at laboratory classes
2. Observation of classroom teaching
3. Individual studies

Gunma University provides the study of elementary and junior high school education, school education system, and multicultural education. The program students can participate in laboratory's research activities depending on their major and career, and deepen their professional ability with Japanese students.

▪ Japanese language education

“Preliminary Japanese Language Intensive Program”

Pre-Intermediate level's Students (Japanese Language Proficiency Test Level N3) are given an intensive 16-week-Japanese course (5 days per week) between October 2023 and February 2024 at GUIC in Aramaki campus. For students who do not meet N3 level, an online supplementary Japanese Language course will be offered based on their language skills. After the intensive program, students can continue studying Japanese with other international students in order to improve the language ability further.

▪ Specialized training

Supervisor takes responsibility to advise the program students depending on their majors and needs. The students are required to take the professional classes and seminar in the lab. Registration of other classes aside from their research field would be acceptable if they want. Tutorial system is provided by an advisor considering each student's research subject.

No lectures are taught in English but the language might be used in advice on lectures, practice, individual guidance and daily life in supplementary means.

▪ Practical Training, Participatory subjects such as field trips and regional exchange, and others

The student's position is research student. No credits are certified. Outside activities such as visiting and lecturing at affiliated schools (kindergarten, elementary school, junior high school, school for children with special needs), excursion and so on are held.

We provide information on international exchange of GU and grasp the status of our graduates at SNS site. We expect that graduates will interact with each other inside and outside the site starting from the account of GU. We also respond to questions from our graduates to our faculty members.

◇ University overview

○ Characteristics and history

Chiba University was founded in 1949. Today Chiba University has developed into a large “comprehensive university”, with 10 undergraduate schools, 13 graduate schools, 20 centers for education and research and 4 affiliate schools. Our aim is to foster professionals who “always aim higher” and who will tackle anything they do with integrity and a broad perspective.

The history of the Faculty of Education, however, goes back to the year 1874. For more than 140 years, the Faculty has contributed significantly to the training of teachers throughout Japan. The number of students enrolled in the Faculty totaled a record 1,602 as of FY 2019. Now, the Faculty of Education consists of the following courses: Elementary School Teachers, Junior High School Teachers, Expert Division for Compulsory Education, English Education, the Education of Children with Special Needs, Early Childhood Education, School Health Nursing (Yogo) Teachers. The Graduate School of Education has two master programs starting from FY 2016: Division of Advanced Professional Development in Education Professional Degree Course and Course for School Education. In addition to these special fields of study, it also has a Center for Practical Education Training and 4 attached schools, that is Kindergarten, Elementary School, Junior High School and the School of Special Needs Education Attached to the Faculty.

Geographically, Chiba University is conveniently located near Narita International Airport and is within easy reach of central Tokyo in 50 minutes. It is a very favorable environment for study and research.

◇ Course Outline for Teacher Training students

○ Characteristics of the program

In order to provide international students from various academic fields with effective teaching, the Faculty of Education provides courses on the Japanese Education System and comparison with that of other countries. In order to be able to carry out their studies more effectively, students are also taught the necessary basic educational terminology.

Furthermore, in classes and study groups, international students study together with Japanese students and have opportunities for exchange of opinions with local residents and teachers, in order to make a better understanding of education system in Japan and some countries and deepen international exchange.

At the end of the period of study, each student writes a paper, and these are made into a bulletin and each student receives a certificate of attendance.

○ Number of students to be accepted: Approximately 20

○ Course outline

• Japanese language education (preparatory studies)

Period: six months

Contents: Japanese language courses and Japanese Studies

Details: Japanese language courses are offered at the Center for International Education (CIE), Chiba University. CIE offers courses at beginners through to advanced level, depending on the classes. CIE also offers a number of courses on Japanese culture and society in English or English-Japanese combined.

• Specialized education in the Faculty of Education

Period: one year

Students should take lectures, seminars and discussions in the specialized field under the academic mentor.

Some classes may include participatory subjects such as field trips and regional exchanges with Japanese students/residents. Students can also study educational conditions in various countries and gain educational knowledge or skills for international mutual understanding.

This class will be held in Japanese language. Students should write a final report in English or Japanese to finish up the learning outcome in Japan.

• Others

Visit educational institutions: the University of the Air (radio/TV based courses for lifelong learning), schools for children with special needs, elementary, junior and senior high schools, social educational facilities.

Cultural and social experiments: visiting historic sites for education, cultural and historic experiences, various exchanging and training opportunities, international exchange parties hosted by university and faculty.

◇ Follow-up for graduates

Each academic mentor makes follow-up guidance. Students and graduates are well connected by SNS.

○ Characteristics and History

(1) Tokyo Gakugei University (TGU) is located in Koganei City, which is about thirty minutes away from Shinjuku by train. Although located in Tokyo, the university is situated in a serene environment and is surrounded by greenery.

TGU was founded in 1949, integrating four “normal” schools, and has produced many talented individuals who now serve in the field of education across Japan.

In 1988, in addition to the teacher training courses, liberal arts courses were established in an attempt to train a wider range of students able to contribute to society, including in fields other than education. In 1996, the United Graduate School of Education (doctoral course) was inaugurated with the aim of producing researchers in education, focusing on school education.

TGU is affiliated with 12 schools, including those for children with disabilities. It also boasts of an impressive list of institutions specializing in teacher training, such as Organization of Support Centers for School Teachers, Organization for Innovative Development of Educational Human Resources and so on.

◇ Outline and characteristics of the course for Teacher Training Students

○ Characteristics of the program

Under the guidance of an academic advisor in the education division, students receive instruction that focuses on the broad field of education. The program also provides students with opportunities to visit affiliated schools for interactive classes with students.

An intensive Japanese language course for beginners (about 10 classes x 15 weeks) is available during the first semester for students whose Japanese language proficiency is inadequate.

○ Outline of the Program

- Japanese Language Education

Five levels of Japanese language courses are available, from the beginning level up to advanced level. Students can choose the appropriate course depending on their Japanese language proficiency. Japan studies courses conducted in both English and Japanese as well as the coeducation cross-cultural subjects with Japanese students are also available.

- Specialized Education

Students receive various forms of training under the guidance of an academic advisor. The training includes courses related to their specialties, individual research, school visits, and seminars.

- Field Trips and Workshops

Workshops on regional performing arts, visits exploring traditional Japanese arts and cultural activities such as Kabuki and Sumo; and excursions to local museums, facilities, and interactions with affiliated schools, etc. are conducted.

◇ Follow-up for graduates

- Student research reports are published as the results of their training, and they are sent to the students as well as the concerned institutes of higher education.

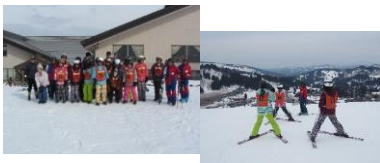

○ Characteristics of the program

Since one of the aim of the Graduate School of Education is to provide the recurrent education including the theoretical and practical studies for teachers, two-thirds of the quota of the graduate students is allocated to incumbent teachers in Japan. Thus, the international students can exchange their views and experiences with these students including teachers to lead productive student lives.

- Japanese language education

Students will take a six-month intensive Japanese language course designated by MEXT. However, if the student has a certain level of Japanese language ability, he or she will receive specialized training at JEUN for one and a half years.

【One year course for students required the intensive course】

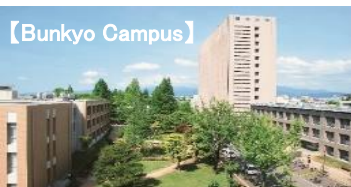

Japanese Language Education

The students who need to learn Japanese Language are to attend the intensive Japanese Language course at Kyoto University for 6 months. Japanese Language classes are also available at KUE after the course.

Specialized training

Under the guidance of an academic advisor, students conduct a research project. They also attend regular classes at KUE with permission of the professors.

—One Year Course

One-year specialized training after the intensive Japanese language course completed.

—One and Half Year Course

○ Characteristics of the program

The teacher-training program at Hyogo University of Teacher Education (HUTE) is designed for school teachers from foreign countries (referred to as international school teachers) seeking for higher levels of pedagogical competence and abilities. This program provides a broad range of opportunities for interdisciplinary study and research in school education. The Graduate School teaching staff provide research opportunities to meet the needs and interests of the international school teachers.

○ Outline of the course

• Japanese language education

- 1) The international school teachers are required to take the Japanese Language Course at an institute (usually at Kobe University) for 6 months: October 1, 2023 – March 31, 2024.
- 2) Supplementary classes for Japanese language are offered at HUTE (once a week): April, 2024– March, 2025.

• Specialized training: April 1, 2024 – March 31, 2025 (One year)

Each international school teacher pursues his or her professional training according to his or her individual program; taking classes with Japanese graduate/undergraduate students, a special seminar under the guidance of the international school teacher’s academic supervisor, and educational practicum at elementary and secondary schools. The program is based on the international teacher’s academic interests, Japanese language ability, and professional competence. Since most classes are conducted in Japanese, it is desirable to achieve a certain level of Japanese language ability through the six months of language training in Japan. To complete the program, teacher training students are required to submit the final reports on their research studies and make the presentations.

○ Outline of the course

If we judge that you are required to study basic Japanese language, you will attend the basic Japanese course at the JASSO Osaka Japanese Language Education Center for six months, and then have in-service teacher training at our university for one year. Those who are not required to study Japanese will take in-service teacher training for one year and six months at our university.

• It takes about 10 min to Kintetsu-Nara Station by bus, and the closest bus stop is about a 5 min walk. The campus is a 5-15 min walk from the student residence.

※The Basic Japanese Language Course costs approximately ¥200,000 for a six-month stay in a dormitory at the JASSO Osaka Japanese Language Education Center. The commuting time to school is approximately 2 minutes on foot. If there are no vacancies in the JASSO dormitory, you will be placed in a flat arranged by JASSO or in our university dormitory. In this case, students will need to pay an additional transportation fee.

◇ Important Supplemental Information

Students must buy National Health Insurance (about ¥2,500/m) and Comprehensive Insurance for Students Coupled with Personal Accident Insurance for Students Pursuing Education and Research (PAS) (about ¥3,000/y). Students also must have a chest X-ray taken in Japan.

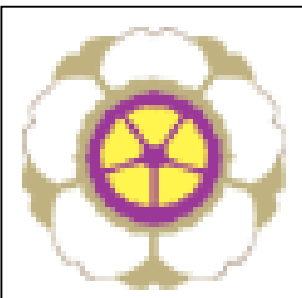

○ Characteristics and history

Okayama University was founded in 1949 on the basis of its predecessor, Okayama Medical College and Sixth High School, which were founded in 1922 and 1900 respectively. It now has 10 faculties and 8 graduate schools and is one of the biggest national universities in Japan.

One of its characteristics lies in its emphasis on international exchanges. Institution for Education and Student Services provides Japanese language courses to International Students and International Affairs Department and the institution office which will accept the student will supports their living in Japan.

◇ Outline and characteristics of the course for Teacher Training Students

○Characteristics of the Course: The first 6 months focuses on the mastering of Japanese language and culture for the beginners and in the remaining one year trainees have a teaching-training to achieve the aims of own specialties.

○Number of Students to be Accepted: up to 12

○Outline of the training course:

•Preparatory Japanese Language Education

•From October to March, for 6 months, Preparatory Japanese Language is taught at Institution for Education and Student Services, totaling 600 hours.

•Different classes are prepared depending on the student's proficiency level and their use of Chinese characters in their mother tongue.

•Supplementary Course is provided for each level.

• Teaching Training [1 Year Course]

•Academic supervisors make research plans according to the interests and Japanese language ability of teacher trainees through interviews. Teacher

trainees take courses on campus and educational practicum at the neighboring elementary and secondary schools in line with their research plans and purposes.

[1 Year and a Half Course]

•Teacher trainees can take Teaching Training Course from October, if academic supervisors allow the exemption from Preparatory Japanese Language Education for teacher trainees by October.

* Teacher trainees may have an interview with their prospective academic supervisor in advance.

○Participatory Subjects such as Field Trips and Regional Exchanges

•Participatory subjects such as school visits and international exchange programs at elementary and secondary schools in Okayama are provided.

◇Follow-up for graduates

Okayama University founded Okayama University international Alumni Association in October 2011. The Okayama University International Alumni Association will serve as a way to disseminate information between alumni association members and International students at Okayama University in addition to providing alumni who do not belong to the association a way to stay connected with Okayama University. Okayama University hold Super Global Homecoming Day and have a place of exchange for alumni and international students.

○ Characteristics of the program

The Division of Educational Sciences in the Graduate School of Humanities and Social Sciences aims to contribute for educational research, practices, and human resources development in the levels from early childhood to higher education towards the construction of a sustainable and peaceful world. The Educational Design for Teacher Educators Program and the Educational Studies Program are prestigious institutes in the area of education in Japan and the world. We have nurtured a great number of leading teachers, teacher educators and educational researchers on early childhood education, primary and secondary education, special needs education, and higher education. The International Education Development Program has widely contributed for the human resources development in Asian, African, and Latin American countries. We have accepted a total number of 125 teacher training students from different countries since this program started. We will educate those who will create new educational values and knowledge to realize sustainable development and peace for human beings and societies!

• Japanese language education

A six-month intensive Japanese language course at the elementary level is offered in the Morito Institute of Global Higher Education (about 30 hours of instruction per week). As long as main supervisor accepts, they could be admitted directly into academic training (if necessary, with the intermediate or advanced Japanese Language/Japanese Affairs course) for one and a half year without the above-mentioned intensive language course.

• Specialized training

We provide for individual academic tutoring by main supervisor and conduct in-depth research on respective training themes during one-year academic training. At the end of the course, teacher training students are required to submit their final report as a part of their course work.

• Practical training, participatory subjects such as field trips and regional exchanges

Extra-curricular activities and cultural programs with Japanese students will be organized by university such as school visits, exchange programs, tours to historical places in Hiroshima.



◇ Follow-up for graduates

Main supervisor will conduct follow-up activities for graduates rather than institutional activities. All the graduates are actively working in their own country as a leading teachers with high expertise.

◇ Accommodations

During the half-year of the Japanese language education period, the International House (University Dorm for International Students) is available. During the specialized training period, there are options of off-campus housing, such as recommended apartments by the University, public housings, and regular private apartments. Applications for accommodation will be accepted by online form or e-mail before arriving in Japan (around July).

In order to cover living expenses and set-up costs until the time of the first scholarship payment, it is suggested that students bring a minimum of ¥ 100,000 with them to Japan.

○ Characteristics and history

Ehime University is located in Matsuyama City. The university has 7 faculties with a graduate school in each faculty: Law and Letters, Education, Collaborative Regional Innovation, Science, Medicine, Engineering, and Agriculture. The number of students is about 10,000.

The university also has a kindergarten, elementary school, junior and senior high school and a school for disabled children. There are many opportunities for international students to visit the classes of these schools.

The cost of living in Matsuyama is fairly cheap compared to other cities in Japan. It takes only 5 minutes to the city center from the main campus by bicycle. Being a flat city, the only transportation you need is a bicycle.

◇ Outline and characteristics of the Teacher Training Courses

This training course is designed so that students can acquire the minimum necessary Japanese expressions and lifestyle habits for daily life before starting the Specialized Training and Intensive Japanese Language Course. A support system for Japanese language classes is provided by local residents.

○ The number of students to be accepted: 5

▪ Japanese language education

a) Survival Course: A two-week course that will give you a good introduction to life in Japan. The course includes both a Language Skills and a Life Skills program.

b) Orientation: A two-day orientation for international students provides vital information for student life, a welcome party where students can get to know each other.

c) Intensive Japanese Language Course: This is a comprehensive language program for one semester. A class on Japanese culture is included. Some classes, such as "Studies on Japanese Culture", are held in English. During this time a homestay with a Japanese family is arranged in order to practice the Japanese you learned.

d) Standard Course: After completing the intensive course we offer higher level classes in which you can continue your language study.

▪ Specialized training

a) Teacher Training Program: Students are assigned to a supervisor in their field of study. After the intensive language course, the students will work directly with their supervisor. The research schedule will be planned with the supervisor based on the proposal made by the student.

b) Program Design: Your study program will be designed to your needs as much as possible. According to your field of study, you will conduct in field work, experiments, surveys and/or classroom observation. At the end you will be expected to write a final report.

▪ Study Trip: Once in two years we take our international students to experience snow, for other years we go to places of historical or cultural interest, such as Kyoto and Nara.

◇ Follow-up for graduates

After completing the program, supervisors will follow up with students via email and web meeting systems, etc.

◇ Accommodations

Nagasaki University consists of ten faculties and schools including School of Global Humanities and Social Sciences, Faculty of Education, Economics, Medicine, Dentistry, Pharmaceutical Science, School of Information and Data Sciences, Engineering, Environmental Studies and Fisheries. The Committee for International Students was established with the cooperation of all the members of the Faculty of Education. It aims to

help international students achieve success in their study or research goal. They leave the door open to talk and are student-friendly. Parties, study tours, and various curriculums will be offered for International students.

○ Outline of the course

- Japanese language education

Students take intensive Japanese language program provided by the Center for Japanese Language and Student Exchange for the first six months as research student. Lessons are provided 10 hours per week according to the Japanese proficiency level of the student. Classes are divided into three levels as elementary, intermediate, and advance.

- Specialized training

According to each student's specialized subject, one or more faculty members will supervise him/her. The student will take seminars and lectures for a year under the supervision of the professor(s). The student must submit a thesis (Japanese or English) at the end of the course.

- Practical training, participatory subjects such as field trips and regional exchanges

Students will visit elementary schools and junior high schools in town and talk about their country, lifestyle, culture, customs, etc. By actually visiting schools, students can experience what the Japanese education is like as well as deepen the understanding of the field of Japanese teaching through interaction with children and teachers.

- Others

Students experience Japanese culture such as Japanese dance, traditional flower arrangement, and Japanese tea ceremony in Japanese language education.

The purpose of Kumamoto University's teacher education program is to give basic and professional knowledge and skills in various areas of Japanese education. The Faculty of Education conducts specialized courses for students who wish to be kindergarten, elementary, junior, or senior high school teachers in the following subjects: Japanese, social studies, mathematics, natural science, music, art, health and physical education, industrial technology, living sciences, English, special support education (pedagogy, psychology), and school health nursing education.

○ Characteristics of the program

- Students will study their specialized fields and audit the classes of their specialized fields and of Japanese language under the guidance of their advisor.

- Students could participate in field trips and Japanese local internship. They will have opportunities to study with Japanese students.

○ Number of students to be accepted: no more than 3

○ Outline of the course

After six months' Japanese language education at another institution in Japan, students will study at the in-service teacher training program at the University of Miyazaki for one year.

- Students will study their specialized fields under the guidance of their advisor.

- Students have to submit the report on their research by the end of February 2023.

- Students could audit the classes of their specialized fields and Japanese language classes under the guidance of their advisor. (They cannot get credits for the classes they audit.)

- Students could have opportunities to visit elementary and secondary schools and take part in cultural exchange activities with pupils at these schools.
